Is It the 'Flu or a Cold?

October is National Influenza Prevention Awareness Month and Canadians are stepping up their efforts to stamp out the flu. Prevention is the best medicine, but when you're already sick, how do you know if you have a cold or the flu so you can treat it accordingly? The flu and common cold share symptoms, such as a runny, stuffy nose and sore throat. However, chills and a high fever that come suddenly and last three to four days as well as a sudden headache may be signs you're suffering from the flu.

Other common flu symptoms include general aches and pains, a persistent cough with phlegm production and severe fatigue lasting two to three weeks. Moderate to severe chest discomfort accompanied by coughing is another indicator you might be suffering from more than a simple cold. (The flu is not to be mistaken with SARS, which is characterized by the development of a fever greater than 38° C and one or more of the following respiratory symptoms: cough, shortness of breath and difficulty breathing. In some cases, symptoms such as muscle aches, headache and sore throat may also develop.)

Like a cold, the flu is usually treated with plenty of rest and fluids, as well as an over-the-counter medication such as ibuprofen or acetaminophen for fever and muscle pain. Prescription anti-viral drugs may also be useful to shorten the severity and duration of symptoms in uncomplicated flu, but they only work if they're started early (within two days of developing symptoms).

Left untreated, the flu can lead to serious and possibly life-threatening complications in patients at high risk, such as seniors in nursing homes/chronic care facilities as well as adults/children with chronic cardiac or pulmonary disease or other chronic conditions (such as diabetes, cancer, immunosuppression and renal disease.)

Frequent hand washing (with soap and water for at least 20 seconds) is one way to curb the spread of both colds and flu.



However, flu prevention can be taken one step further with an annual vaccination, to help halt the spread of

the disease and reduce the severity of symptoms. Influenza vaccination is currently recommended for all



children, adolescents and adults, unless there is a contraindication to receiving the vaccine (e.g., anaphylactic reaction to a previous dose of flu vaccine).

The Boiler Blows its Stack! A Message from the University of Alberta

During the past year the University constructed a new steam boiler and a new exhaust stack in the existing Heating Plant. They were built to meet the utility needs of the University of Alberta, the University of Alberta Hospital, the Cross Cancer Institute, and the Mewburn Veterans Centre. Before going into full operation, however, the new boiler will require a series of steam blows to clean it and the pipe that connects the boiler to the steam-driven turbine power generators located in the Heating Plant.

A similar commissioning exercise was conducted in the winter of 2000 and, similarly, the steam blows this year will produce clouds of steam and some noise arising from the southeast corner of the plant. The cleaning process will take place on the following two weekends of November, 2003:

- Saturday, Nov. 1, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.
- Sunday, Nov. 2, 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. and
- Saturday, Nov. 8, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.
- Sunday, Nov. 9, 9 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Dear Constituents,

If you live near the university, or work at or attend a post-secondary institution in Alberta, you should pay attention to Bill 43. Although it hasn't garnered much public attention Bill 43 is one of the most important pieces of legislation brought forward in Alberta in years.

Bill 43, the *Post-Secondary Learning Act*, replaces the *Universities Act* and other legislation, bringing all universities, colleges, and technical institutes in Alberta into one enormous system called "Campus Alberta". In the process a lot of things will happen.

To the good, the neighborhoods near the university get some protection. I've worked closely with communities surrounding the U of A main and south campusses to

- 1) constrain the university's power to unilaterally expropriate land, and to
- 2) modify its complete exemption from municipal zoning.

Bill 43 recognizes our concerns. It removes the unilateral right to expropriate, and requires 'primarily commercial' developments by the university to respect municipal zoning. These are big benefits to neighbors living next to a university with huge expansion plans.

But I have very serious concerns with other aspects of Bill 43. It transfers tuition fee caps from legislation to regulations, where they can be changed with the stroke of a pen. And it concentrates huge power with the Minister of Learning:

- · He must, in law, approve the university's business plans;
- · He must approve all university programs;
- · He can dissolve university boards of governors;
- · He can dissolve duly elected students union boards;
- · He can send in 'auditors' and 'investigators' with powers to seize and collect evidence;
- All instructors at post-secondary institutions have their right to strike legislatively removed.

Bill 43 turns Alberta's entire post-secondary education system into a single hierarchy, with the Minister of Learning at the top, holding the legislative powers to decide what will be done and to enforce compliance.

This is being done despite the fact the portion of university budgets covered by provincial funding has been declining for many years. Last year less than half of the University of Alberta's budget came from the province.

This Bill was introduced in the Legislature last spring, and will probably be debated this fall.
