Windsor Park Naturescape



As many of you will be aware, the Windsor Park School Council wanted to create a legacy in honour of the 50th anniversary of Windsor Park School, and thus initiated a project to naturalize a space in front of Windsor park School. The project consists of the development of a naturescape situated to the right of the school's front entrance, adding substantially to the few existing trees and plants. It includes: an amphitheatre, seven raised planters, and a nature interpretive area. The area will provide food and shelter for wildlife, will be for use by staff and students of the school for curriculum activities, and will provide a communal space for the enjoyment and use of the Windsor Park Community. This project will both help to enhance the environment as well as provide educational benefits to students and community members alike.

The amphitheatre area will be available for use by the community for meetings, educational programs and even musical presentations. It would also be available to be an integral part of the summer playground program.

The total budget for the project amounts to about \$83,000.00. This budget includes the hard landscaping. amphitheatre, plant materials, planters, landscape architect costs and a maintenance fund. An ongoing working group of the school council has been struck to ensure that the program continues to be maintained when present members and school staff have changed. Already, the Windsor Park Community League has made a wonderful, much appreciated donation to the project, and we are currently very busy applying to all available government and private foundation grants that are available for such a

project. We have applied to the Centennial Trees program, and are currently applying for the Edmonton Community Foundation, and Federal EcoAction grant programs.

Please consider making a donation to this project, and provide your own lasting legacy to the neighbourhood. A donor recognition monument is planned for the naturescape, and gifts of \$1000 or greater would be recognized on the monument. Any amount you and your family would like to provide for this project would be very much appreciated. A charitable donation receipt will be provided for any gift over \$25.00. If we can come closer to our goal in the next few months, we could break ground in 2005. Please help!



First Aid for Seizures

An epileptic seizure is caused by an electrical discharge in the brain that affects body function for a short time. Symptoms include a brief loss of consciousness, a change in motor activity, or behaviour. These episodes often occur without warning and vary in type from person to person.

Excessive alcohol consumption, stress, flickering light, fever and sleep deprivation are all known to trigger seizures, which can be grouped into two types: convulsive and nonconvulsive.

People experiencing a convulsive seizure become rigid and may fall. Their muscles relax and tighten, causing their body to convulse. During a non-convulsive seizure, an individual will experience a brief interruption of consciousness and appear blank or staring and unresponsive to those around them.

If someone experiences a seizure, here are steps you can take to ensure his or her safety:

- Stay calm and do not restrain the person having the seizure; let it take its course.
- Move hard or sharp objects out of the way, loosen tight clothing (especially at the neck) and place something soft and small under the head.
- Do not put anything into the person's mouth as this can pose a choking hazard.
- Roll the person onto his or her side, allowing saliva or other fluids to drain away.
- If the seizure lasts longer than five minutes, call for medical help.
- Stay with the person after the seizure, providing comfort until he/she becomes reoriented to the surroundings.

Anti-epileptic drugs have proven effective in preventing or reducing the frequency of

seizures in 70-80 per cent of patients suffering from recurrent epileptic seizures. When diagnosed, your doctor can recommend the right therapy for you. Your pharmacist can also help you make the most of your medications, ensuring the correct dosage and suggesting strategies to minimize or manage the side effects of these drugs.



Cross Cancer Institute to Begin Phase 1 Redevelopment

Basement excavation will provide much needed space for patient care and laboratory upgrades

The Alberta Cancer Board works to provide cancer care and compassionate support to the many thousands of Albertans who walk through our doors each year. We also deliver cancer services to Albertans in a variety of means, collaborating with many health regions around the province to bring cancer services close to home for our patients. In a similar spirit of working together we have engaged members of the community league executives of the neighbour-hoods around us regarding our re-development project.

In February 2005, the Cross Cancer Institute is scheduled to begin Phase 1 of a redevelopment project, that will add between 2,400 to 2,500 square metres (24,000 to 27,000 square feet) of much needed new space on its basement level. The renovation is required for two reasons: to increase space for patient care; and to upgrade radiopharmaceutical-production laboratories to make them compliant with new federal standards.

Excavation is expected to begin in February and to last three to four months. During this time, area residents may see an increase in truck traffic during normal business hours as the basement is excavated and debris is hauled away. However, ACB is committed to minimizing as much as possible the disruption this important redevelopment causes to our neighbours.

We have shared information about the impact of the project on our cancer-

care efforts with members of the Windsor Park and Belgravia community league executives. Those representatives also toured the proposed redevelopment area.

During our discussions, your community league representatives asked that ACB provide residents with up-to-date information on the project and a means to register concerns regarding noise, traffic, parking or other issues. We expect that noise will be mitigated in large part because the excavation and construction will occur underground. In addition, the ACB and its contractors will comply with the City of Edmonton's noise bylaw #7255.

The Cross Cancer Institute is committed to providing you with timely information about our redevelopment project as details are finalized in the coming weeks. We will soon publish www.cancerboard.ab.ca/crossreno to provide you with easy access to information about our activities, including FAQs. We ask that if you have questions or concerns, to please call us at 432-8508 during business hours.

We look forward to maintaining contact with you, the residents of Belgravia and Windsor Park, and to working together on any concerns that arise out of the redevelopment project.

December 26 Tsunami

Now that the tsunami disaster in the Indian Ocean has moved off the front pages and the breathless TV headlines, it may be worthwhile to consider what should be done in the long term. I am curious how the skill set resident in Windsor Park can, and probably already does, contribute to the long term recovery of the area. Many of you will know that I have a professional interest in earthquakes and some exposure to SE Asia, but that professional skill is not very useful after the fact. I suspect that others have more useful skills and similar cultural understanding though.

It was very clear by noon on Boxing Day that Sumatra had been hammered. Everything below 10 m. above sea level on a lot of that island's west coast was destroyed, in some cases as far as 5 kms inland. The impact on the society and economy of the fertile coastal plains is enormous. The shaking from the earthquake will have done damage in Sumatra much further from the sea. Sri Lanka's damage was solely due to the tsunami but it too has a lot of development on a low coastal plain.

It strikes me that the relief organizations currently working in the area might be able to place engineers, medical people, educators, and agricultural specialists where they can help rebuild the infrastructure. There is unlikely to be a financial profit, but the work will no doubt be interesting. Neighbourhood Planning

EFCL Representative

Development issues are beginning to bubble at the EFCL Board level. No one in Edmonton's communities seems happy with the current consultation process. In spite of the Plan Edmonton, planning seems to be driven by the ideas of developers who quite correctly first consider their own bottom line. The planning department appears to be understaffed and demoralized but council is beginning to recognize there are problems. South Edmonton Common was a wake-up call. Heritage Mall is also drawing attention.

At a planning Committee meeting, EFCL's planning specialist Felix Horne described a Vancouver model for planning that could be adapted to Edmonton. The approach emphasizes consensus rather than confrontation. In essence Vancouver neighbourhoods design a plan for their community while they are not under pressure of developers and validate that with a local plebiscite. Businesses, and the city planners have input into the plan, but ultimately a majority of residents (including renters and business proprietors) must vote for it.

Once the plan is in place, the city tests development proposals against it and usually considers them if they meet the plan or rejects them if they do not. There are a few exceptions such as heritage buildings. There is little or no input from the community. There

appears to be little use of the DC2 zoning so abused in Edmonton; the conflict inside the community is reduced; and the divisive statutory hearings before council are largely eliminated. The community plans are reviewed, by the community, typically every 5 years and it is at the review that developers can attempt to influence the process.
