What to do when they wet the bed

Another soggy morning? If changing your child's wet sheets has become part of your morning routine, take heart. You're not alone. It is estimated that at least 15 to 20 per cent of five-year-olds wet the bed on a regular basis. It is a condition that tends to run in families, with boys more likely than girls to have trouble staying dry throughout the night.

Often, children who wet the bed are deep sleepers who have difficulty waking up for a trip to the bathroom when they sense their bladders are full. Bedwetting (especially after a dry stretch of six months or more) can also be related to an emotional event such as moving to a new home or the loss of a loved one.

The good news is that children often outgrow this condition by puberty, as their bladders increase in size and they develop better bladder control.

Children seldom wet the bed on purpose and are often embarrassed when it happens. Rather than make them feel ashamed, parents need to lend their support and encouragement to help them overcome this problem.

Parents can also help by: • Limiting liquids (and caffeine) before bedtime; • Encouraging the child to go to the bathroom before lights out;

• Waking the child during the night for a bathroom trip;

• Praising the child on dry mornings; and

• Avoiding punishments.

In some cases, bedwetting is related to a medical condition. Parents should discuss bedwetting with their child's physician, who can investigate further. A number of medications and therapies are available for the treatment of bedwetting. Your pharmacist can answer your questions about these options.
