Message from the President

I would like to thank everyone who volunteered for our recent casino. Just a brief update on West High **Speed Transit:** the City has woken up to the fact that it may not be possible to run the LRT line next to the Cross Cancer Hospital. We do not know for sure, yet, as the City is having some trouble finding a qualified consultant. However, the City has again entered into negotiations with the Province and the University regarding running WLRT to the South Campus Station. This will generate other issues, such as potentially worsening the mess that is the 114 Street and University Avenue intersection, but at least all options appear now to be open to proper investigation.

My name is Alex Thomas and I am a Constable with the Edmonton Police Service, South Division. I am currently tasked as the Community Liaison for your area for EPS. As such, I send this letter to you to inform you of my position and offer you my contact information.

In September 2005 a program called Report A Drug House was initiated in the South side. The program focuses on possible drug houses or suites within complexes and terminating the operation at these locations through anonymous tips. This initiative would not be successful without your help and I feel this is a great relationship between the Edmonton Police Service and the community.

I believe developing connections between police and community stake holders such as yourself is vitally important in ensuring your concerns are addressed. Please feel free to contact me directly and discuss any outstanding issues or concerns.

Creating a Safer Community

The Edmonton Police Service South Division has launched a new program to combat the increasing number of drugrelated crimes committed in south side neighbourhoods.

This program enables residents to easily report neglected homes in their area that may be responsible for fostering criminal behaviour.

Call 426 8229 and describe the address of the residence, your neighbourhood, the activity surrounding the premises and what you suspect is occurring. Leave your name and number so police can contact you. All information received will remain confidential. The address will be checked by a police officer.

What to look for in your community

- Increase in Traffic—vehicles and people coming and going at unusual times
- Unusual strong odours
- Decline in the appearance of the home's exterior and landscaping
- Residences with blacked out windows
- Unusual amounts of garbage
- Residents who set their garbage in neighbouring collection areas
- Unfriendly residents who appear secretive about their activities
- Residents who do not appear to regularly attend/leave for work but drive expensive vehicles

Pesticide-Free Edmonton

Dear Neighbours,

At the moment our yards are covered with snow, but in the next couple of months we will be seeing our lawns greening up and another tell tale sign of spring, the little vellow signs peppering our roadways and boulevards. These signs are caution signs marking areas that have been sprayed with herbicides. Even the grassy area right outside the Cross Cancer Clinic on 117St is periodically covered with these warning markers. I'm sure many of you are aware that many Canadian municipalities and the entire province of Quebec have now implemented bylaws phasing out the use of herbicides for cosmetic purposes on public lands (visit www.stopcancer.org for details), and I'm hoping that our City will follow suit.

Many doctors and other health experts, including Edmonton pediatrician Dr. Henry Pabst are raising the alarm about the increased rates of asthma, and of lymphomas, and other cancers, especially in children, and they're linking them to herbicide and pesticide exposure. Children are at greater risk of exposure because of their small body mass, rapidly growing tissues, their tendency to roll/crawl on grass with exposed skin and inability to recognize signs that indicate spraying. As a parent and a concerned citizen, I believe these chemicals are putting us at risk; they're on our sports fields, school grounds, public spaces and our boulevards, and are also contaminating our drinking water.

In 2001, the right of municipalities to forbid the use of chemical pesticides on public and private properties was established by the Supreme Court of Canada. Our community has an opportunity to be proactive by immediately choosing to have our parks

and school grounds exempt from spraying.

Concerned citizens who live close to a green space can petition the city to add that space to its list of No Spray Zones. This can be achieved by contacting Gary Chan, the Vegetation Management Specialist at the City of Edmonton. He can be reached at 944 5414, or emailed at Garychan@edmonton.ca.

In the coming months the *Sierra Club* and *Pesticide-free Edmonton* will be launching an information campaign about the issues around the use of herbicides for cosmetic purposes. I hope you will take the time to inform yourselves about the risks posed to ourselves, our children, our pets and our environment by these toxic chemicals, and will be ready to support this kind of proactive bylaw when it is proposed in the spring. 
