Message from the President...

Snow!

I don't know about you, but winter's sudden onset came as a bit of a shock to me this year. I must confess I even ignored my increasingly snow-congested driveway for a day or two. I had been out on my scooter only the day before the snow arrived and was hoping to go out again soon. I am now starting to get somewhat pessimistic about my chances.... Time to start waxing the toboggans, I guess.

All this brings me to a few important points. First, I need to apologize to my mail carrier for being so discourteous in those first days of disbelief, and then to remind us all that we count on each other to keep our sidewalks clear. Aside from legal considerations, it is just plain common sense to keep your walks clear and safe for others to use. All Windsor Park residents benefit from everyone's efforts at sidewalk clearing.

For any who don't know, the City of Edmonton requires that sidewalks be cleared within 48 hours after the snow stops falling. Should a snowbound sidewalk bar your way, you can call the City at 496-3100 to register a complaint. They will investigate and issue a warning notice. If the warning is ignored, a ticket will follow and then a bill, if the City ends up doing the work. The Citizen Action Centre (496-8200), Southeast Edmonton Seniors (468-1985) and the Seniors Association of Greater Edmonton (423-5510 ext 314) can all

link seniors with snow-shovellers who charge reasonable rates.

Windsor Park is very grateful to Michael Frost who so conscientiously clears the community hall's walks for us all.

Mature Neighbourhoods

The City is encouraging developers to infill older, established areas with higher-density developments. Usually, this means the creation of townhouses, multiplexes or other relatively low-impact structures within areas previously zoned RF1 or similar. Unfortunately, there have also been some proposals including highrises of up to thirty stories. In reaction to these inappropriate proposals, the Mature Neighbourhood Action Group (mnag.ca) has been formed, and its mission statement is:

The mission of the Mature Neighbourhoods Action Group (MNAG) is to empower communities to engage the City of Edmonton in identifying, legislating and implementing community-centred, responsible development and restructuring in established neighbourhoods.

The group is ably chaired by Bill Eadie of the Glenora Community League. I am also involved and we hope the group will evolve into a respected, reasoned voice at City Hall.

Lister Hall

It gives me great pleasure to thank the Lister Hall Students Association for all their efforts on our behalf. For the last

two years, they have run a marvelous children's Halloween haunted house at the WPCL hall. Well attended and even more enjoyed, the event is something to look forward to each year. It is great to have so many young people helping out.

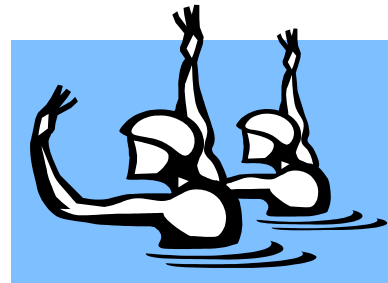

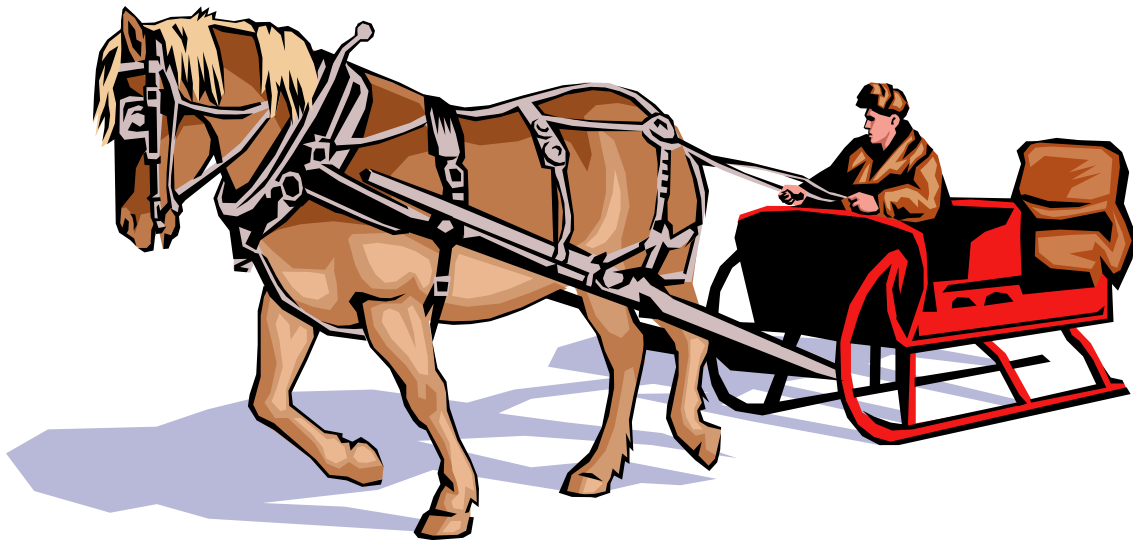

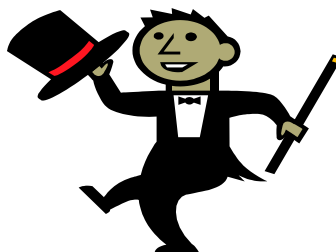
Windsor Park Talent Show

Windsor Parkite, Margaret-Ann Armour joins the Order of Canada



Dr. Margaret-Ann Armour's e-mail has been flooded with congratulations since Gov. Gen. Michaëlle Jean announced the University of Alberta professor is among the 77 people named to the Order of Canada this week.

Armour, the associate dean of Science (Diversity), is a founding member and former Vice-chair and Convenor of Women in Scholarship, Engineering, Science and Technology (WISEST), a position she held for over 20 years. Often touted as Canada's premier ambassador of science, she has worked tirelessly through WISEST to encourage young people, especially young women, to consider careers in the sciences and engineering through numerous community outreach programs.

"It is very special for me to be recognized in this way by my adopted country," said Armour, who hails from Scotland and became a Canadian citizen last year.

Established in 1967 to recognize outstanding achievement and service in various fields of endeavour, the Order of Canada is the nation's highest honour for lifetime achievement. The Order of Canada's motto is *Desiderantes meliorem patriam* - 'They desire a better country.'

"I can't think of a better way of building a better Canada than helping direct young women into careers that

they might otherwise not have thought of - careers in science, technology and engineering," said Bill McBlain, U of A associate VP (Research). "My first reaction to this announcement is that it is an extremely, unquestionably deserving award."

Armour's contributions to the science and technology communities have been recognized with numerous national and international awards. These include the Montreal Medal from the Canadian Chemical Institute; the American Chemical Society Award for Encouraging Women into the Chemical Sciences; a 3M Teaching Fellowship; the Macleans Honour Roll of 10 Canadians Who Are Making A Difference; and one of 100 Edmontonians of the Century.

While Armour said that each award has been special in its own way, she added "this one is extraordinary because it recognizes a wide range of individuals, not only scientists, who have made a difference."

But Grace Ennis, the current coordinator of the WISEST program, said the recognition for Armour also goes beyond the realm of science.

"First of all, she has the patience of a saint," said Ennis. "WISEST was just a very small seed of an idea and it has taken a lot of nurturing to turn it into this full, mature tree that is bearing so much fruit. But Dr. Armour is a woman who has contributed in so many ways to a variety of groups. I've seen her approached in airports by her students who say, 'I remember when I was in your class and you helped me sort out what I needed to do.' I've seen the pure rapture of Grade 6 girls who are discovering science and the way Margaret-Ann can hold a conference room full of them in the palm of her hand. She has a way of listening to who you are."
