Coyotes

Approximately 400 to 600 coyotes are in Edmonton. Most of these are in the river valley and surrounding creek areas; however, more and more are foraging in the city proper and becoming habituated to human contact. Each year a few coyotes completely lose their fear of humans and start to regard children as potential prey.

Fortunately, the number of problem coyotes is small, but this number is slowly increasing. You can help by never feeding coyotes. This includes careful management of your garbage, fallen fruit and litter, and not leaving pets outside unattended, so that coyotes are not attracted to an area. You can report problem coyotes to a City of Edmonton Park Ranger at 496-2950.

Edmonton Police Service -Auto Theft/Theft from Auto



This area is currently a prime target for auto theft and theft from auto related crimes.

Vehicle crime can happen to anyone. As a community partner, EPS is asking you be aware of the risk and do what you can to prevent becoming a victim. It is important to recognize that the majority of vehicle related crimes are committed to support other criminal activities such as robberies, drug dealing or evading police through flight. Any vehicle is susceptible.

In 2005 the Edmonton Police Service (EPS) investigated just over 9,000 vehicle thefts and almost 14,000 thefts from autos.

What EPS is doing:

The EPS has created TRAP (Tactical Response for Auto Theft Prevention) to assist in reducing the number of vehicle related crimes in Edmonton through public education (door to door awareness campaigning), at risk youth prevention programs and by actively targeting chronic offenders.

BAIT cars are also being used in your area to catch criminals, and ultimately provide a viable deterrence for would-be vehicle thieves. BAIT cars have been electronically rigged with specialized technology to allow EPS members to monitor the vehicles with the intent of capturing and identifying criminals.

Roll up the windows
Hide the valuables
Take the keys
Lock the doors
Every time!

What you need to do:

- Turn ignition off and take the keys with you
- Never leave valuables in the vehicle
 - Completely close all windows
 - Always set the emergency brake
 - Park in attended lots
 - Never leave your car running
- Do not leave registration and insurance in your vehicle
- To make illegal towing more difficult, park with your wheels turned toward the curb and back into your driveway if you have a rear wheel drive or four wheel drive
- Activate vehicle security system/Club device
- Ask you neighbour to watch your vehicles(s)—do the same for them

Stay Safe During the Winter Season

Winters in Edmonton bring us both mild and severe weather and it seems no two winters are ever the same. With this past blizzard and deep freeze we have endured the City has been proactive to provide Edmontonians the best possible service to try and keep our roadways safe and clear and ensure all citizens are aware of appropriate and effective snow and ice control.

For your information, there is a priority system in place to keep traffic moving throughout the city. Cross river roadways, hills, overpasses, arterial roads, collector and bus routes, roads adjacent to schools, hospitals, homes for the aged and rural roads are all priorities during snow storms. The City also receives a customized weather report four times a day from Environment Canada in order to actively respond to changing weather conditions.

Last year the City received over 120 cm of snow with 45 cm falling in November alone. Both city plows and contracted workers work 24 hours a day seven days a week to ensure safe conditions for drivers, as was required for residential plowing during mid December 2006.

Also in regard to safety, you need to remember that it is important to remove the snow from your sidewalk adjoining your property within 48 hours after a snowfall. The City will clear snow from schools, hospitals, seniors' homes and all City owned property. For seniors there are many organizations that will assist with snow removal. Please call the Citizens Action Centre at 496-8200 for information on obtaining this service.

Old Man Winter creates a winter wonderland for most but he also loves to cause us grief and unpleasantness when the weather turns down right vicious; however, if we work at staying proactive and always one step ahead of him then we can keep conditions safe for all. Always remember to keep your car and yourself prepared for winter weather, expect to take longer to get to your destination and most importantly, drive defensively.


