Message from the President...

Old Shopping Center Rezoning Update

By the time you read this, Bylaw 14711 will have been passed by City Council. This will rezone the old shopping center on 87th Avenue from CNC to DC2 zoning, to allow the construction of a four-storey, 38-unit condominium. We have been working on this proposal since 2003, and it has involved two different developers, two different community league presidents. three public meetings, dozens of meetings with Planning and Development, scores of committee meetings and innumerable emails, letters, phone calls and street conversations.

Are we happy with the result? While I think it is the best we could achieve considering the changing development climate in Edmonton, we all regret the loss of neighbourhood commercial space. In letters and presentations to Council, we have emphasized the importance of neighbourhood commercial spaces, such as doctors' offices and cafes, to any vibrant community. We have flatly stated that we expect any redevelopment on the old Esso site to include a significant commercial component.

The members of our Planning Committee, and other key parties, are to be thanked and commended for their years of hard work on the many permutations of the development plans and the DC2 bylaw. I would like to single out three people for special mention.

The first is Brian Kropf, the community planner for the Edmonton Federation of Community Leagues, who has been invaluable in helping us with all the details in the bylaw. The second is Guy Woo, who has represented the developer to the community, and helped facilitate straightforward, open and positive communications. The third is Elaine Solez, who has worked tirelessly for the last five years to ensure that the building would have as little negative effect as possible on the surrounding community. Job well done to everyone involved, and a special thanks to those three.

The Community League Role

Many of you may have been following the story of the role of the community league. Below are letters by John Collier to the Edmonton Journal and Elaine Solez to the Edmonton Federation of Community Leagues (EFCL) and City Council.

John Collier

As a community league president, I was surprised to hear that some Councillors are trying to stop us from engaging in community advocacy and consultations. As a matter of fact the evening of the story breaking found me at a City community consultation meeting with one of the complaining Councilors. This particular meeting was on west high speed transit and the process has involved meetings virtually every month and started in February of 2005. I report back to my community though executive meetings and the community newsletter. The feedback I receive I report back to the City and has resulted in significant alterations to the City's plans. This is just one of many meetings I attend on behalf of my community.

Imagine my chagrin on finding that certain Councilors feel my time would have been better spent organizing soccer games – which, I am happy to say, is ably handled by other hard working community volunteers. The irony is that these City organized meetings have had me missing my son's own soccer games. I even missed the first goal he ever scored! Would I have rather been at my son's game? Absolutely!

I feel community involvement is important for making Edmonton a better place to live for my children, you, your children and me. I don't begrudge missing an occasional soccer game; and, it doesn't really bother me that some Councilors don't seem to appreciate my efforts. However statements like these will discourage others from getting involved in their community, their city: Edmonton. You and I will be the poorer for it.

I was astonished by the views of some members of City Council presented in the Journal article.

To state the obvious, if I recall correctly, Edmonton's zoning bylaw requires community leagues to be notified whenever a development in their community has a variance, thereby providing an opportunity to agree or object and, more importantly, to work with the developer on making changes that will make the development more acceptable to the community. The bylaw also requires developers of DC2 applications to work with the community league affected by their project and to present information in their development application about their consultation with the community and how community concerns have been addressed.

If the league and the developer do not come to an agreement, community leagues have every right to present their objections to City Council through the public hearing process. This is part of the democratic process.

EFCL's planning resource provides excellent advice to help communities deal with developments. EFCL makes presentations to Council on city-wide issues, not particular developments, unless they have city-wide impact. In those instances the presentations are to provide suggestions to Council, such as speeding up SLRT construction to service Century Park to ease traffic congestion in south Edmonton.

The Journal article indicates some members of City Council may have forgotten the content of its own bylaws as well as the purpose of community leagues and EFCL.
