Message from the President...

Crime in the Neighbourhood

One day this summer my family had bikes and other items stolen from a shed on our property. We reported the matter to the police, alerted bike shops, and were fortunate enough to recover the most valuable one. Living on a major pedestrian route, we assumed ours might be an isolated, opportunistic incident. As summer drew to a close, however, I received news of a break and entry to a home in the neighbourhood. I posted this to our email distribution list. The floodgates opened, and reports of house break-ins and thefts from vehicles in Windsor Park poured in. To learn more about the scope of problems in our area, I contacted the Edmonton Police Service (EPS) and arranged for their community liaison to attend our next regularly scheduled executive meeting that was held on September 16.

As always, the meeting was open to all community members, and ten residents attended, in addition to the executive. Sqt. Steven Young of the EPS came well prepared with up-to-date statistics for this year, as well as comparative data from past years. He was able to assure us that Windsor Park's crime incidents had actually declined in the past year. Residents raised concerns, however, that the current incidents were of a more serious nature, as some of the break-ins occurred while the people were home. Residents also raised concerns about the presence of a drugfriendly house on 117 Street. Sgt. Young reported that the EPS were aware of the house and working with the occupant and owners to improve the situation. Nearby residents are helping the police by recording license plate numbers of vehicles visiting the house.

WPCL AGM

Sgt. Young was so helpful that we have asked him to attend our up-coming Annual General Meeting, so that all residents can have the opportunity to have questions answered on crime and crime prevention in our area.

The AGM will be held Friday, October 17, at the WPCL hall (11840 – 87 Avenue). The meeting will start at 7 pm with a brief business meeting. While nominations for all executive positions are welcome from the floor, a full slate will be presented for attending residents to consider. Sgt. Young will be up next, followed by wine and cheese (and dessert!) and more informal discussions. Everyone is welcome to attend, and even to run for the executive. While you may be assured there will be no arm-twisting at the AGM, it is my dream that we'll one day have a real election, with rival candidates, to spice up our annual meeting!

Federal Election

Speaking of elections, we have done our darnedest to ensure that Windsor Park has a polling station in the up-coming federal election. Our polling station will be at the Windsor Park Elementary School and open from 7:30 AM until 7:30 PM on election day, Tuesday, October 14. Advance polling days are Oct. 3, 4 and 6, noon to 8 pm at the City Arts Centre, 10943 – 84 Avenue.



Noise Graffiti

The most common complaint I have had this summer has been about the intrusive noise of excessively loud mufflers on both motor bikes and cars. What makes this kind of noise particularly frustrating is that it is completely unnecessary. Any mechanical advantage gained by loud mufflers would be negligible in legal city driving conditions. There has been a lot of attention paid recently to the problems of littering and graffiti. In my mind the invasiveness on the enjoyment of others of loud mufflers is no different.

It is part of the challenge of a large city that we must find ways as individuals to coexist with our neighbours and fellow citizens. Some clash is inevitable and unavoidable. But loud mufflers and car stereos, which essentially do little more than say 'look at me' at the expense of another's ability to enjoy peace and quiet, go well beyond the bounds of common courtesy. I believe it is essentially the equivalent of running into a strangers back yard or onto their balcony or into their living room, interrupting and yelling at them, 'look at me I'm riding my motorcycle.' Most people would never dream of doing that to a friend let alone a stranger and yet that is what is happening every time a loud bike or car drives up or down a street. It is particularly problematic late at night.

On paper the city has bylaws to control this kind of behaviour, yet currently we have been very unsuccessful in actually curtailing the sonic invasion. In response to the numerous calls and emails I have had on the subject I have asked our administration to bring back a report on what we are currently doing, what tools we have to deal with the issue, what are the limitations of those tools, what are other cities are doing, and what changes could we make to more effectively deal with the problem.

We are expecting to deal with the report sometime in September. If any of you have any thoughts on the matter or would like to present to us on the issue please let me know.
