

Citizen's Panel – Amazing Work!

The Edmonton Citizen's Panel recently invited me for a brief look at the work they are doing. I was very impressed with what I saw: such a wide range of people coming from all stations of society, not just the usual suspects talking to each other as sometimes happens. This group was to be as broadly reflective of the public as possible. They started with very different expectations and experiences and diametrically opposed points of view. Their job was to come to agreement about what values need to be reflected in city spending. The question posed was how to make the kind of city that Edmontonians expect and to pay for or "How We Spend Our Money Reflects Our Values".

Over six weekends this 53 person group worked diligently to agree to conclusions. Many members were very doubtful they could agree with the other people on such personally held beliefs. For instance, how are we, as a city, going to reach our goals? How do we need to change in order to get there?

And they did come to some conclusions, several which are important components of a workable medium sized city that is socially and economically viable. It is interesting that "cutting taxes" was not considered one of the goals. The report is now being written and I am excitedly waiting to see what the focus will be. Such vital topics as transportation, community safety, community living, and planning issues are all mentioned in some way.

Watch the City's website for the final report. Go to www.edmonton.ca and enter "citizen panel" in the search box. As well as a very good exercise in citizen democracy in Edmonton, I expect the report to make a real contribution to our thinking. Stay tuned!


