LDS Institute Expansion Update

We have had a grand old time dealing with the demolition contractor and illegal parking issues since the last newsletter. The contractor knocked down a phone line, missing a power line by mere inches in the process, severed a water line and some signage may have gone astray.

The now empty lots were instantly, and illegally, filled with parked vehicles. Many emails and phone calls galvanized the City into ticketing and towing and, thankfully, the LDS Church into installing fencing.

My thanks to the affected residents for keeping me abreast of all the ongoing shenanigans and for their patience while we stoked the fires necessary to motivate the City's enforcement arms.

We had a very good session with LDS Church representatives at January's executive meeting. They presented detailed plans for the properties and graciously received our comments. I am pleased to report that they are currently giving serious consideration to a counterproposal from the executive.

ETS Route 313 Update

We met with an Edmonton Transit representative at November's executive meeting and the news was not good. Route 313 is almost right at the bottom of the utilization list, and that is why service was reduced last fall. If we want the service to return to the previous level, the community will need to lobby our politicians for action: Ben Henderson (Ben.Henderson@edmonton.ca) and Mayor Stephen Mandel (stephen.mandel@edmonton.ca).

Park Redevelopment Update

I am pleased to report that the City was able alter the site plans so that we will still have two soccer fields and an eight-foot high sledding hill next to the basketball courts. I am grateful to the City, the members of the park redevelopment committee and the residents along 119th St. for their work and patience on this issue.

Efforts of Friends of Scona Pool, as well as impressive and sustained increases in the number of pool users last year, were instrumental in City Council's decision in November 2010 to put the pool back into the City's base budget starting in 2011.

Keeping Scona Pool Open

I am pleased Council was able to approve continued funding to keep Scona Pool open for the foreseeable future. This local pool and its variety of programs and wide user base keystones of this healthy, engaged and active community. I recognize the importance of smaller community facilities to help make a more cohesive community. We need to strengthen ties to schools and businesses in residential areas to create stronger, more attractive, complete and diverse communities.

With unprecedented numbers of school closures in the mature neighbourhoods of recent years, pressure toward community fragmentation builds. Keeping Scona Pool open provides a counterbalance to that negative pressure. Scona Pool's continued operation, as an historic neighbourhood facility with roots going back many years, helps provide community stability. As a local community facility, it will doubtless feel friendlier to some patrons.

Our new municipal development plan, "The Way We Grow" indicates a need to reduce urban sprawl and make better use of existing infrastructure, public facilities and services in our mature neighbourhoods. We need to take great care managing change in our older neighbourhoods. I see keeping Scona Pool open for business as one part of that. February Is Heart Month

Do you know the signs and symptoms of a heart attack and what to do if someone experiences these? Knowing can make the difference between life and death.

Recognizing and responding immediately to the warning signs of a potential heart attack can significantly improve survival and recovery. **February is Heart Month** - take the time to be heart safe and learn how you can reduce your risk.

What to do when seconds count

• Call 9-1-1 immediately. Early treatment can greatly reduce heart damage and make the difference of life and death.

Treatment starts the moment EMS arrives. Paramedics can provide oxygen, start an intravenous and perform an electrocardiogram (ECG).
Paramedics can also administer important medications in the early minutes of a heart attack to lessen heart damage.

• During transport, EMS will also share information with the hospital so definitive treatment can begin immediately on arrival.

• Take a CPR/AED (automated external defibrillator) course. Training is widely available from many reputable organizations. It's easy, inexpensive, and only takes a few hours.

Know the signs of a heart attack

(Any or all of these signs & symptoms may occur)
Chest pain described as crushing, squeezing, pressure or chest heaviness;

• Pain that moves beyond the chest such as shoulder, arm, neck or jaw pain;

• Shortness of breath, sweating or nausea and vomiting.

Reduce your risk

Heart attack risk factors include:

- Obesity
- Sedentary lifestyle
- Smoking
- High cholesterol
- Age / Gender
- Family history

Speak with your doctor about how to treat your modifiable risk factors and learn to be heart safe.

• **February 12, 2011** @ **noon to 3pm** - Register in-person at the Windsor Park community hall. You will need to bring a copy of your on-line registration and payment to complete this portion.

• **March 10, 2011** – Completion of team formation. The teams are formed using a priority of Windsor Park/Garneau, University district and finally SWEMSA as a whole to ensure everyone has an opportunity to play.


Early April – contact by coaches, uniform distribution, etc.

The Corner Store Project Tell us about your neighbourhood

There's been a shift in Edmonton's retail landscape away from local community and neighbourhood shops. Shopping malls, mega commercial strips, and power centres with stand alone big-box format stores dominate the shopping landscape.

This shift has drawn people away from shopping in their own neighbourhood at local corner store businesses and small local shopping centres. As a result, there's been a decline in the number of neighbourhood stores and businesses, and a physical deterioration of many residential shopping sites.

The purpose of the Corner Store Project is to explore the actions the City might take to revitalize small neighborhood shopping sites in mature neighbourhoods.

The City of Edmonton wants to hear what you think about your neighbourhood shopping sites and how you use them; specifically sites that are small with 3 to 10



shops and are located within or on the edge of a residential neighbourhood. Your information will guide us as we assist small businesses, property owners and residents to improve these centres and to make them valuable parts of your local community.
