Exciting News for Windsor Park Playground

Thanks to a provincial grant received in December, the long-awaited spray pad in our playground is moving forward.

At a recent Special Meeting on February 20, enthusiastic neighbourhood residents overwhelmingly voted in favour of the Special Resolution, allowing the league to proceed with the project. The project, located between the playground, the gazebo, and the 119th St fence, is now ready to go to tender. The design will include spray elements, non-slip rocks, benches, and landscaping. Community members will have the chance to preview the design once the bids are in.

Construction is anticipated to start this summer, hopefully in June, with eager parents, grandparents, and kids looking forward to enjoying this new neighbourhood amenity. It's important to note that once built, the City will handle operations and maintenance, including water costs. Stay tuned for more updates in our enews!

A TIDBIT OF WINDSOR PARK HISTORY

In 1948, Windsor Park was re-subdivided, with the area between 116th and 117th streets south of 87th Avenue designated for multi-family housing. Architect Jean Wallbridge led the redesign, creating a central park that includes a school, playground, community league building, and mature tree-filled north park. In 1952, the City swapped 9 acres of Windsor Park land for \$15,000 and 6 acres near the University of Alberta. Today, Braithewaite Park and part of the Cross Cancer Institute occupy the former Windsor Park area.

The Windsor Park Press is a quarterly community newsletter covering news, events, programs, schools, businesses, and residents within the Windsor Park area.

Civics, Planning and Park Progress

City Council's Urban Planning Committee (UPC) deliberated over revised district policies and plans, sparking community concern regarding the removal of clear boundaries on nodes and corridors. This move potentially allows for boundary expansions and rezoning implications, prompting residents to engage with City Council and express their apprehensions.

The District Planning Team is diligently revising planning documents based on fall feedback, slated for presentation at a Public Hearing in May. Proposed amendments to the Zoning Bylaw have been circulated for review, prompting Windsor Park Community League to scrutinize the changes to ensure they align with neighbourhood interests and values.

The league pledges to inform residents of any amendments that could impact the community negatively. These proposed amendments are scheduled to be considered at the April 22 City Council public hearing.

Simultaneously, progress continues on the **North Park Enhancements Project**, aiming to rejuvenate the park's features and historical elements. The project includes repairing the retaining wall, introducing a labyrinth, native flowering plants, enhancing accessibility, and upgrading amenities.

Preliminary cost estimates have been formulated, and funding sources identified, in accordance with the City's Neighbourhood Park Development Program (NPDP) process. The league, in collaboration with the City, is advancing Part 2 of the Business Case, which is currently under review by relevant city departments.

Upon approval, the league will proceed with applying for **Municipal Historic Resource Designation** for the park, with the project anticipated to go to tender in 2025. Additionally, the labeling of unique mature trees in the park, completed in 2022, complements the park's heritage restoration efforts.

The project aligns with heritage restoration funding initiatives, underscoring the commitment to preserving historical and natural assets within the community.

Celebrating "An Early Spring" in Windsor Park Community Hall
