The Community League's Role is to Bring People Together

WPCL believes that a connected community is a stronger, more resilient community.

Community leagues are non profit organizations, registered under the Alberta Societies Act. They exists to serve and enhance the local community. Windsor Park community league's goal is to **create a welcoming**, **vibrant and connected community**. We know that the benefits are enormous - from reducing social isolation to resilience in the face of crisis.

Community Spaces bring People Together

The good news is that community resilience starts with small steps e.g. an introduction or an invitation. We know that our neighbours are interested in social gatherings, community celebrations and working with their neighbours on projects. Leagues create **opportunities for connection** by building and maintaining, enhancing community facilities that encourage us to participate comfortably in community life - places where we might say hello to a neighbour or share a meal, and it encourages programming within these spaces.

Our membership is made up of people who care about their community and who support the aims of the league to make Windsor Park **a better place to live and be.**

Our voting members elect new board of directors elect a new Board every year to oversee the operations and activities of the community league.

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This board sets priorities, ensures compliance with bylaws, laws and regulations, engages with the community through encouraging participation in events, programs and initiatives, manages community league facilities (hall and rink), oversees hall rentals, maintenance and upgrades, provides financial oversight of league funds and organizes revenue generating activities (membership, rentals, grants, fundraising, donation drives), recruits and supports volunteers to run events and programs, hires and supervises staff and contractors for operational roles, liaises and represents the community with other organizations e.g. City of Edmonton, and builds partnerships with local groups to address shared goals e.g. safety, health and wellness and safety. It's a small but hard working team!

Encouraging our Community to Get Involved

Our league engages and supports groups of interested residents to help achieve priorities that are based on: what the community tells us it needs and wants; who is available to help out as well as their skills and availability.

Currently, our **Development Subcommittee** reviews all development applications relevant to Windsor Park, the **Spray Park Subcommittee** has been working to install a spray pad near the WP playground, the **North Park Enhancement Subcommittee** brings together residents who are passionate about our park resources, and our **Preschool Subcommittee** operates the Windsor Park Preschool. Our **Sports and Recreation Team** ensures that our kids get to play soccer and our rink is open all year round.

Bringing people together who have similar needs, wants and passions.

Going forward, we'd love to connect neighbours interested in planning events in the community. We are also looking into other community programming opportunities such as e.g. community safety and health and wellness.

What's Proposed for the Windsor Park Shopping Centre?



The Developer's Proposal

Westrich Pacific has submitted a proposal to develop the Windor Park Shopping Centre site into a 25-storey slim residential tower surrounded by a podium that's 4 storeys at its edges and 6-storeys near the tower on the shopping centre site, and a 4 storey on 117th St attached to the podium. A mix of commercial and residential units is planned for the podium and the 4-storey building. The plans call for closing the existing east-west alley behind the shopping centre and creating a new alley along the north portion of 8719 - 117 St.

City planners are currently reviewing the rezoning application. This review includes gathering public feedback and circulating it to other City departments and agencies (e.g. EPCOR) for input.

What's the Background to this Rezoning Proposal?

Earlier this fall City Council approved the **Scona District Plan** and the **District Policy** bylaws. Following the approval of the **City Plan** at the end of 2020, district plans and the **General Policy** were developed over about 3 years with input from communities, industry, and the public. The purpose is to accommodate a growing population while reducing urban sprawl through increased housing density.

These new policy documents implement the City Plan and, along with the new Zoning Bylaw, are guiding development and rezoning in Windsor Park and all neighbourhoods in Edmonton. The focus of these policies is to add density throughout the redeveloping area of the city—all neighbourhoods within the Anthony Henday ring -road. The desirability of Windsor Park and other south central neighbourhoods as well as the age and condition of existing development attract higher density development to this area.

The Scona Plan and General Policy bylaws encourage higher density development, **specifically in and near nodes and corridors**. The Windsor Park Shopping Centre is located in the University-Garneau Major Node. Tall high rises (more than 20 storeys) are only allowed downtown and in major nodes. **Two blocks of Windsor Park are included in this major node—from 116th St to 118th St along 87th Ave**. The other properties on those blocks have already been redeveloped to higher density over the last dozen years or so or housewell established churches in the neighbourhood. This means the opportunities for tall high rises are very limited in Windsor Park.

With this particular application, Westrich Pacific is pursuing the opportunity the City has provided in the Scona Plan and the District Policy. The rezoning is very likely to be approved in this new policy context.

Other recent rezoning applications are pursuing higher density developments in the neighbourhood, per the new policies. The 6-storeys on 116th and 118th streets that were approved by City Council while the policies were in draft, and an application for a 4-storey at the south east corner of 87th Ave and 120 St is currently under review.

How does the Community League get Involved?

Community leagues are recognized as interested parties in rezoning and development matters. The league receives notice of rezoning applications and of engagement opportunities. Unlike many community leagues, ours has the capacity to be actively involved in responding to rezoning applications.

The community league board authorizes its development committee to address any planning or development matter within the neighbourhood as well as any community development initiatives and projects that impact the community. This committee reports to the board through the Director of Civics and Park Planning, who is elected at the AGM. The committee plays a valuable role in advocating for the community's needs and is tasked with ensuring that residents have a voice in shaping local developments. While they lack formal authority, the committee provides valuable input to the process by: informing residents about the rezoning and opportunities to provide comments to the City; meeting and providing feedback to the developer and City and considering whether to take a position at the City Council Public Hearing.

Action to Date

The league has been active on the first two points above during the 'feedback phase'. This is especially important given the magnitude of the shopping centre rezoning and the likelihood of approval. Specifically:

- The league has kept the neighbourhood informed about the rezoning application and opportunities for providing feedback through the weekly e-news and at www.windsor-park.ca, and the committee personally delivered flyers to each household and the multi-family buildings and commercial buildings in Windsor Park to encourage participation in the feedback stage.
- The committee met with the developer in summer 2024 the first proposal called for a 30-storey high rise and with City planning staff in September. The committee has reviewed documents related to the rezoning and provided comments to both the City and the developer.
- The committee made recommendations to the the board regarding improvements that would mitigate the impact of the tall high rise on neighbours and the neighbourhood and provide community benefits. These recommendations were approved by the board, and conveyed to the developer and the City.

These recommendations focused on **improving the pedestrian and cycling environment** near the site, including closing the new alley to traffic, **preserving any mature trees** on the site, **improving traffic movement** into and out of the site, b, and **providing family and community friendly commercial uses such as a s**mall grocery store, restaurant, hair salon, pharmacy, yoga studio, bank branch, and child care spaces if needed.

Where are we Now?

As of this writing, the **rezoning application is still in the feedback phase (open until December 9)**. We don't yet know if any of the committe's recommendations will be accepted. Note that some are more appropriate to consider at the development permit stage rather than the rezoning stage, but the rezoning stage provides the opportunity to provide input.

When the planner's report and recommendation to City Council becomes available, it will include the final rezoning proposal, which will reflect any revisions the City has asked for, including any made as a result of public feedback. The league will find the report useful when it is time to consider taking a position on the rezoning.

What Happens Next?

The City planners have still to complete their review of the application and prepare a report for City Council that recommends whether or not to approve the rezoning.

Because this application also includes a road closure, once the planners finish their review of the application, the City's road closure process starts.

The City Council Public Hearing will be scheduled when the road closure process is complete. **The public hearing is expected in March 2025 at the earliest** and will include both the alley closure and the rezoning of the shopping centre and two properties on 117th St.

The league will receive a notice about the date of the City Council public hearing and how to participate. Anyone can sign up to speak for or against the rezoning.

CO-EXISTING WITH URBAN WILDLIFE:

Coyotes in the Community

If you have lived here for any length of time, you will have noticed that Windsor Park often encounters more wildlife, particularly coyotes as the winter sets in. These intelligent and adaptable animals are a common sight in urban areas like ours, and especially near parks, the river valley and open spaces. While they do occasionally cause concern, it's worth remembering that we share the land with them and can coexist peacefully by understanding their behaviour and needs.

Coyotes are essential to the urban ecosystem, controllling populations of rodents and other small animals. Watching them from a distance can be a reminder of the natural beauty we are lucky to have within our community. However, there are steps we can take to reduce negative interactions.

What can we do?

- Secure food sources. Keep garbage bins tightly closed and avoid leaving pet food or compost in accessible areas.
- **Supervise pets.** Always keep dogs on a leash and supervise cats, especially early morning or evening when coyotes are most active.
- Avoid feeding wildlife. Feeding coyotes, even unintentionally, can make them more comfortable around humans and the increase likelihood of conflict.
- Use deterrants. If a coyote approaches too closely, wave your warms, make noise, or use a flashlight to scare it away.

If you do encounter a coyote behaving aggressively or in Windsor Park or another residential area, report it to the **City of Edmonton Coyote Management Program at 311**. For more information on living with urban wildlife, visit edmonton.ca/urbanwildlife.
